



Question: ...[W]e'd like to know whether or not you feel good about various things in this country and in your life. Do you feel good about..., or not?

Percent responding feel good






Question: Considering just the moral climate of the US today, would you say that the US is generally headed in the right direction, or is it off on the wrong track?


Calm Before the Storm


Question: We're interested in your reaction to what's happened in the presidential campaign during the past week. Would you say that the campaign has been informative or has it been uninformative during the past week?


