
Yes to Third Party Candidates, No to Weicker


Question: Generally speaking, do you think it is a good idea for there to be third party candidates in presidential elections, or is it best to have a clear choice between Republicans and Democrats?


Question: As of now, would you like to see Lowell Weicker run for President in 2000, or not?


Questions: How would you rate the job Lowell Weicker is doing as senator? ...governor?




Question: For each of the following people, please tell me if you have a favorable impression of them, an unfavorable impression, or don't know enough to make up your mind... Lowell Weicker?
