Perhaps the most interesting aspect of the data below is what is not here. The Roper Center archive contains a great deal of material from 1969 on Vietnam, the civil rights movement (not represented here simply because it is too voluminous to do it justice in so small a space), education and business. There is very little, however, on the moon landing, or on the death on Chappaquiddick Island of both Mary Jo Kopechne and Ted Kennedy's presidential aspirations. And there is nothing at all

on Woodstock or on the three-day uprising against police by gay patrons of the Stonewall Inn in New York City-now regarded by many as the beginning of the gay rights movement. Maybe, in 1969, some events did not seem as epochal as they do now; and maybe others were so clearly epochal that nobody found it necessary to ask what people thought about them.



Question: America has many different types of people in it. But we would like to know whether you think each of these different types of people is more helpful or more harmful to American life, or don't they help or harm things one way or the other?


Those responding more harmful

Question: Of all the things that have happened anywhere in the world during 1969, which is the most outstanding?



Silent Majority



Uncle Walter Tells It Like It Is


Question: Who is your favorite news commentator on television?

Baby Boom Burden


Question: Do you think there is a shortage of classroom space in this community?
