

**Question**: Have you ever used the internet?






**Question**: These days, do you think it is necessary for people to use the internet if they want to keep up with the times, or isn't it necessary?



Ouestion: Do you personally use a computer to connect to the internet or an online service?







**Question**: Have you ever used the internet, World Wide Web, or online service to purchase anything, or not?




**Question**: All in all, has having e-mail improved your relationships with your family and friends, worsened your relationships with them, or hasn't it affected your relationships with them?

**Question**: What did you buy using the internet, World Wide Web, or on-line service?






## **Brave New World**
