
Today's interest in devolution stems from dissatisfaction with federal government performance, and from an inclination to disperse and decentralize authority. This contrasts with the older "states' rights" emphasis.




Question: Which...do you favorconcentration of power in the federal government, or ... in the state governments?


Question: Do you think there is too much power in the hands of the [federal] government...?


Question: Which...[statement] comes closest to your own views about governmental power today? The federal government....


Question: Which do you think is the most honest and efficient in performing its own special duties?


Question: Which do you think spend the taxpayer's dollar more wisely-the state government or the federal...?








Question: Would you favor or oppose having your state government assume many of the governmental powers and functions now exercised by the federal government in Washington?

When it comes to control of various programs, the public's preference for a shift to the states is evident.
