

**Editor's Note**: Just as the Gallup surveys for Phi Delta Kappa are a valuable longitudinal file tracking the general public's thinking about public school performance, so the American Council on Education (ACE) surveys of *entering college freshman*—conducted each year since 1966—give valuable insight both into changes in American values that impact on education, and changes in the college environment itself. On pp.18-20, Alexander Astin, director of the Higher Education Research Institute at the University of California at Los Angeles, which has conducted these surveys from their inception, discusses important shifts and other findings. Here, we review the data. We also draw briefly on a survey of undergraduates in all four years of training done in 1992-1993 by researchers at the Harvard Graduate School of Education.























Question: ...[I]ndicate which activities you did during the past year?


Percent responding they participated in the activity "frequently"




#### **Everyday Student Life**
