

## Confidence in the National Government Has Not Rebounded in the Nineties




Question: How much of the time do you trust the government in Washington to do what is right—just about always, most of the time, or only some of the time?






Question: When the government in Washington decides to solve a problem, how much confidence do you have that the problem actually will be solved?

















## **Lots of Colliding Values**


Questions: On the whole, do you think it should or should not be the government's responsibility to...?








## **But Individuals Need to Accept More Responsibility** for Their Status

Question: In your opinion, what is more to blame when people are poor-lack of effort on their own part or circumstances beyond their control?





Question: ...[P]lease tell me whether you think [the federal government in Washington] has too much power in the United States today, about the right amount of power, or not enough power...?








