Roper iPoll: Provided by the Roper Center for Public Opinion Research at Cornell University, Roper iPoll is the world's largest collection of public opinion data with **nearly a million survey/poll questions & responses**. Contains data from U.S. and global polling firms with broad topical coverage on social issues, politics, pop culture, international affairs, and more. Questions, trends, demographic crosstabs, and dataset downloads are immediately available. Provided in-app analytic and collaboration tools are designed for novice to expert data interpreters, and everyone in between.

Authentication

Access to Roper iPoll requires authentication by authorized IP addresses, Single Sign-on (SSO), or by registering an account.

IP Authentication

On-campus access can be enabled by providing the Roper Center with the IP blocks for the campus. For off-campus access, we support integration with EZ proxy when provided the IP address of the EZ proxy server.

Registered Accounts

To access user-specific features in Roper iPoll such as folders and activity history, a user registration is required. Registration can be enabled for your users based on approved email **domains** (e.g. @cornell.edu).

Single Sign-on (SSO)

Alternatively, the Roper Center supports integration with members of the Open Athens federation or directly via Shibboleth. SSO is preferred, as it defers authorization to your systems additional security and privacy and giving users a seamless experience by eliminating the need to go through a registration process.

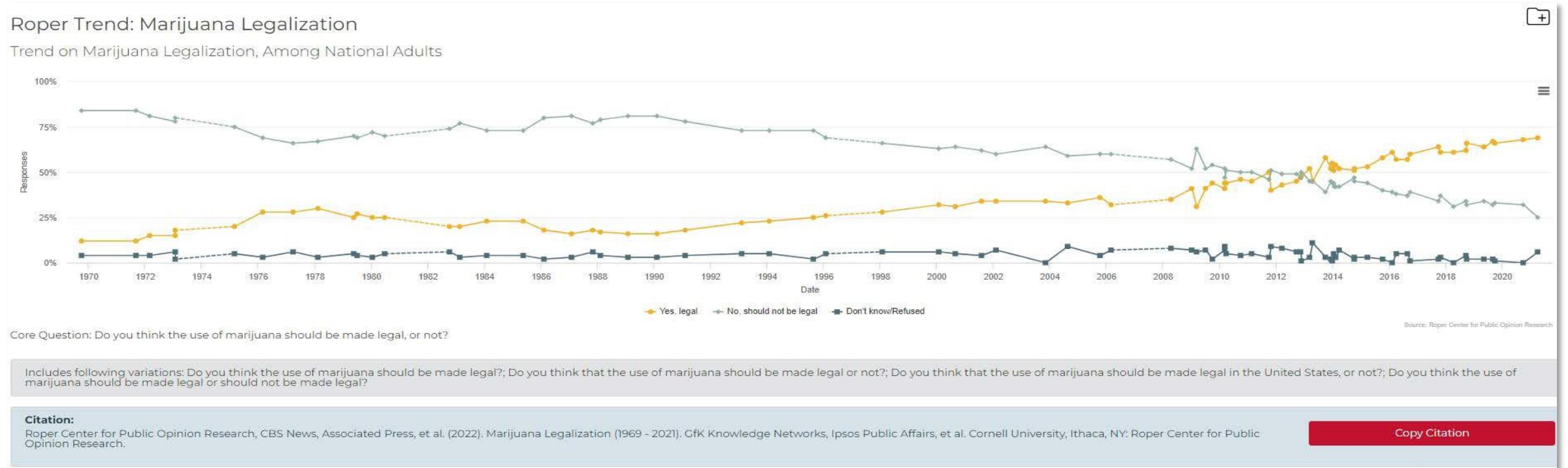

Roper Trends

Roper Trends are curated, over-time trendlines built with best practices by Roper Center data curators, and adhere to the set of standards [described in our trend guidelines](#).

For visualization purposes, [Roper Trends uses](#) lines to connect data points, but changes in public opinion may not be linear. Because long gaps between data points can mask unmeasured changes, data points are connected by solid lines if they are fewer than 2 years apart, dashed lines if they are 2-10 years apart, and dotted lines if they are more than 10 years apart.



Health Polling

A substantial portion of the data in Roper iPoll is health related and the primary purpose of the *Health Poll Node Network* in Roper iPoll, is to educate users on the relationships between virtually every topic related to health; from social determinants and influences on health to insurance, costs, and health-care utilization.

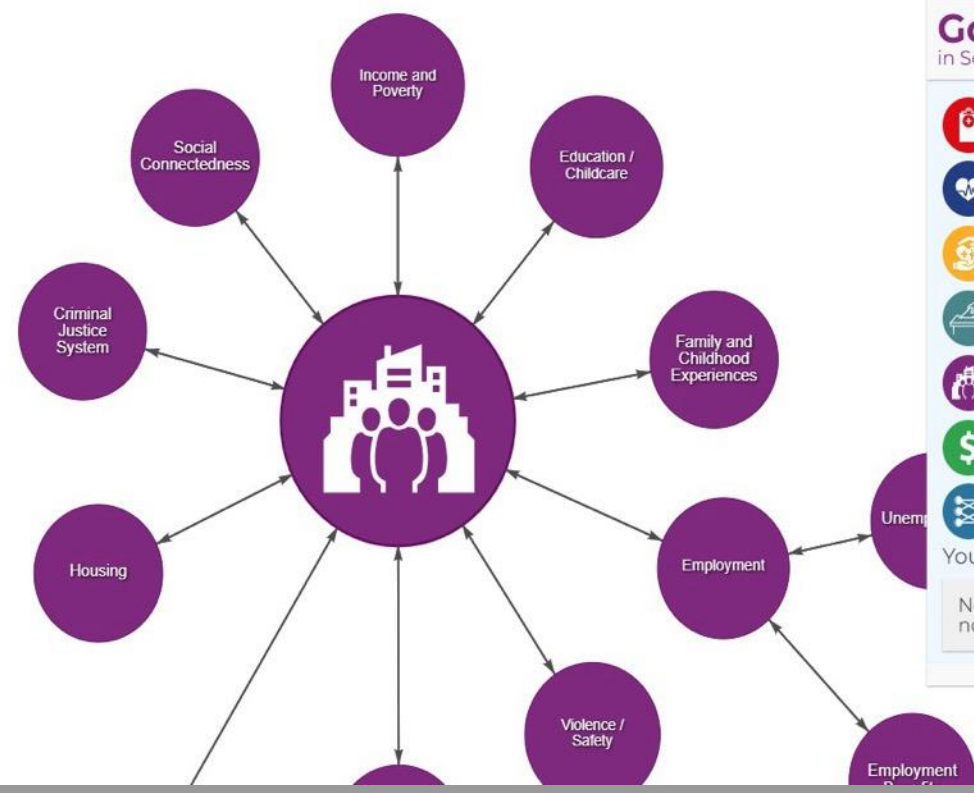

Social determinants of health (SDH) describe conditions in the communities where people live, learn, work, and play and their effect on a wide range of health risks and outcomes.

Questions in this category include Americans' experiences as children, community ratings, workplace experiences, physical environment, and interaction with our criminal justice system.
