


Some Survey Data Give a Superficial Impression of Growing Isolationism





Question: ...Do you favor or oppose reducing the amount of aid the US provides to foreign countries?






Question: Please tell me whether you agree or disagree with each of the following statements...The US should mind its own business internationally and let other countries get along as best they can on their own.


Many Americans Distrust Soviet or Republic **Leaders on Nuclear Arms**



Question: Do you think the Soviet Union can be trusted to cut back its nuclear weapons without a formal treaty, or not?



Ouestion: How concerned are you that the nuclear weapons of the former Soviet Union are no longer controlled by the leaders of one central government...?




The Public Is Split on Reducing the CIA Budget






Question: In today's world, is it still necessary for the US to maintain NATO—its military alliance with countries in Western Europe—or is this military alliance no longer necessary?



Question: Do you approve or disapprove of the US having sent troops to fight in the Persian Gulf?




We Need to Keep a Military Presence in the Middle East...



Question: Do you think we should or should not keep a military presence in the Middle East, like we did in Germany and Korea?




The War Cautions Many Against Making Massive Defense Cuts



In the Former Soviet Union




Question: Would you favor or oppose the US giving economic aid to the Soviet Union in order to help the Soviet Union to prevent a possible famine this winter?



Question: Would you favor or oppose the US giving economic aid to the Soviet Union in order to help the Soviet Union reform its economy?


