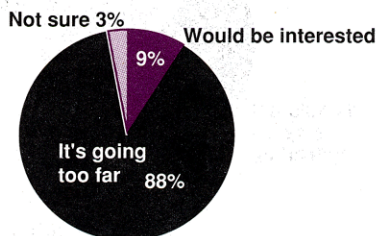

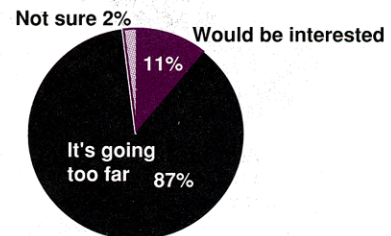
However the Question Has Been Posed, "Genetic Engineering" Has Found Strong Public Opposition

Question: If it becomes possible, do you think the cloning of humans should or should not be allowed?

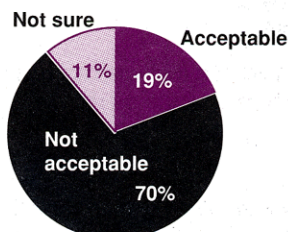


Question: If cloning animals enabled scientists to produce new, lifesaving drugs or medical techniques, then should it be allowed, or not?

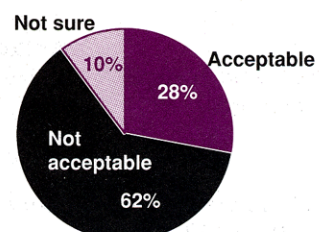

Question: Do you think it is acceptable to use cloning to...reintroduce extinct species?



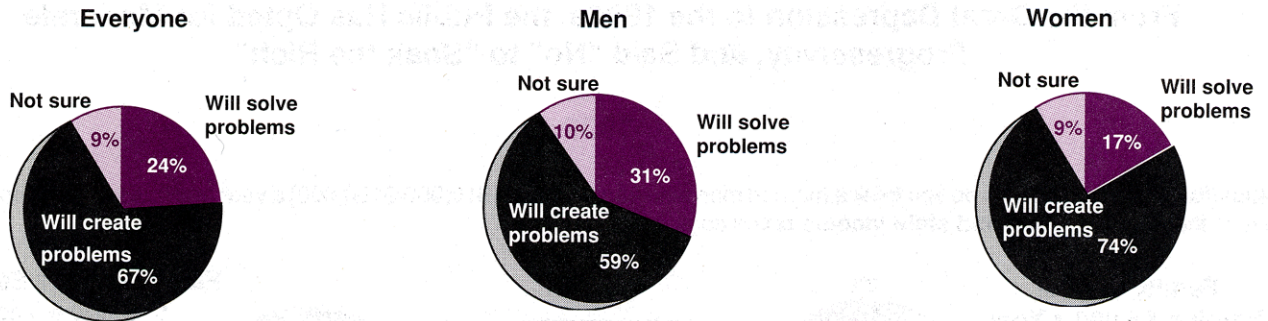
Question: Do you think it is acceptable to use cloning to...reproduce livestock?

To Clone or Not to Clone

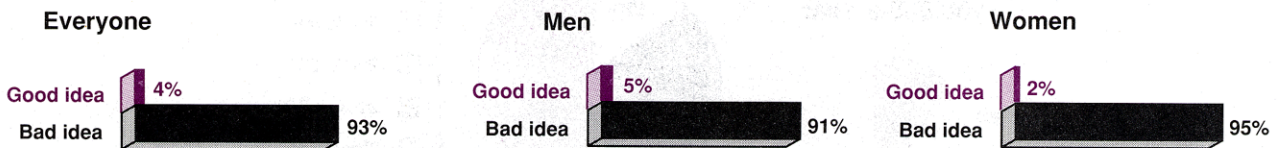
Question: Which do you think is more likely—that the new cloning techniques will help solve some of the problems that the world faces, or that cloning will create more problems than it solves?



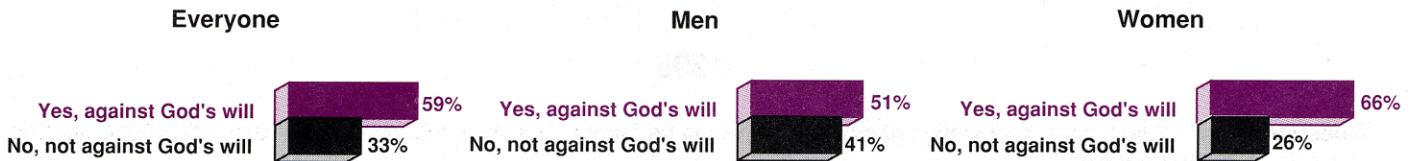
Question: In general, do you think it is a good idea or a bad idea to clone animals such as sheep?



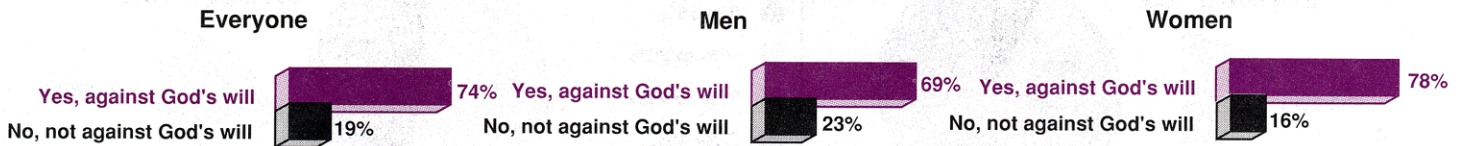
Question: In general, do you think it is a good idea or a bad idea to clone human beings?



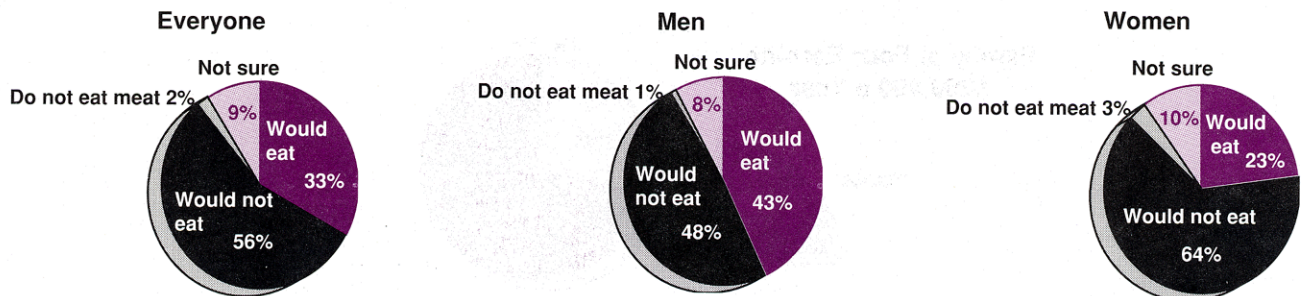
Question: Do you think it is against God's will to clone animals such as sheep, or don't you feel that way?
